Homophone: words that have the same sound but different spelling and meaning.

Common mistakes occur with homophones “there, their, and they’re”.

- There:** in, at or about a place
Ex. The ball is over there.
- They’re:** contraction for “they are”
Ex. They’re going to school together.
- Their:** possessive case for they, two or more people
Ex. Bob and Sue took their coats to school.
