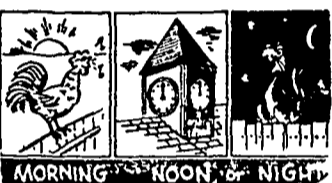

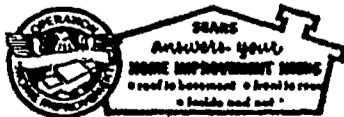

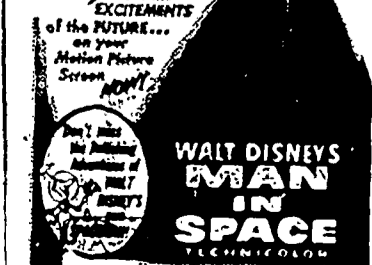

Area News, Notes, Tidbits

The Farm and Supply Co. Inc. of Chester, Pa. has filed a \$648.40 judgement suit in Wood County Common Pleas Court against Robert and Kathryn Hamlin of Bloomdale for payment of an account.

Prof Paul F. Sharp, history instructor at the University of Wisconsin was appointed the 14th president of Hiram College by unanimous vote of the board of trustees. He succeeds Prof Paul H. Fall who finished a 17-year term as president on July 1.

George Scott, a justice of the peace in Ross township for several years is the first candidate to file a petition for the office of County judge. Harold Tyson, clerk of the Wood County Board of Elections announced on Thursday Under a new law county judges will replace the justice of the peace system in Ohio.

Jackson County Fair at Wellston on July 17, 18, 19, and 20 was the first fair held in Ohio this year.

A thief entered the Bernard Leimgruber home at Tontogany Sunday afternoon while the family as out in the back yard washing their automobile. The thief took Mrs. Leimgruber's purse containing \$22, her driver's license and a Blue Cross Hospital Card. The next morning she reported to the sheriff that she had recovered the driver's license — in small pieces. She found her license torn up along a street one block south of her home. She told the sheriff that the family had gone out to wash the car at 4 p.m. and when they returned to the house at 6:30 p.m. her purse which had been placed on the dining room table was missing. A search produced the purse in the living room but the money and papers were missing.

The Sheldahl Pipe Line Co. has been granted a license by the Federal Communications Commission for four high-frequency radio transmitters which will make it possible for automatic operation and reverse of the flow of its pipe line through Wood County. The transmitters will be located in southeastern Toledo, near Bowling Green, near Fostoria and at Nevada, Ohio. The new radio control will make it possible to send four or five different petroleum products through the line at the same time without mixing them.

Mrs. James Hofley of Cygnet, reported to the sheriff's office that her bicycle was stolen Saturday or Sunday from a barn owned by her father, Charles Eichen at the corner of the Cygnet and Solesher Roads in Bloom township. She says it is blue and white in color and is a Sears and Roebuck model.

A fire Tuesday morning at the Hancock County Home two miles west of Findlay, caused several thousand dollars worth of damage to the attic and roof of the building. William Rettig, a farm hand at the home was the only one injured. He was overcome by smoke while helping to fight the fire. The blaze started in the attic. Ninety-seven persons reside at the home.

Dr J R. Janney of 887 W Wooster street, Bowling Green, reported to the police that between \$50 and \$75 in cash was stolen from his locker while he was performing an operation at Wood County Hospital. He said the theft occurred sometime between 8 a.m. and 2 p.m. He said he returned to his locker twice during that time and it was locked both times. He believes a master key was used to gain entrance to the locker.

A Pennsylvania boy 16 years old, who took \$15 from Porky's Quarry Restaurant at Stony Ridge Thursday at 10 p.m. was captured early Friday morning near Swanton when the owner was out for a few seconds. He grabbed the money from a boy behind the counter and then ran out of the restaurant and into a cornfield. Deputy Sheriff Dale Paley and Deputy Sheriff Cloyd McGeiffin who were called to investigate, searched four hours for the boy in the Stony Ridge district. A turnpike patrolman telephoned the sheriff's office and said that the boy is being held by juvenile authorities in Pennsylvania and will be picked up by Pennsylvania State Police. The boy had spent all but \$6 of the money when captured.

Rolland Rhoads, 23, of near Swanton, who is employed on the Harold Bordner farm in Wood County on the Wilmington Road lost his right foot Wednesday, July 17 when he accidentally stepped into an auger carrying machine which carries grain into a bin. He was taken to Wood County Hospital for treatment.

The Ohio-Florida Association will hold its annual picnic in the school building at McComb, Ohio, on Sunday, August 4, 1957 at 6:30 p.m. Bring sandwiches, covered dish, drink and table service. A fine program will be carried out with Mayor Sterling Hall of Bradenton, Fla. as speaker. Cloyd Grubb is president; Arthur Morrison, vice president, and Mrs. Earl Wilch, secretary-treasurer.

Corporal Harold J. Cardwell, son of E. J. Cardwell, who formerly lived on State Route 18 three miles east of Bloomdale and who has been a member of the Ohio State Patrol for the past 11 years has been appointed commander of the Tribby post near Toledo. He succeeds Corporal M. C. Corbin who resigned July 1 to enter private industry as a security officer. After he graduated from the State Patrol Training School near Columbus he was assigned to the Findlay post. He later was advanced to second in command of the Bay Bridge post and then was promoted to corporal when a new post was established at Bucyrus in 1953. His wife, formerly Dorothy Madden of Fostoria and their four children will continue to live in Bucyrus until he finds a house near Toledo.

Chief of Police Ernest A. Richard of Fostoria, native of Bloomdale, was returned to his home Thursday from Toledo Hospital where he underwent an operation two weeks ago. He is improving and is able to be up and around the house.

William R. King of Bettsville reported to Sheriff Ted Paul of Sandusky County that two batteries had been stolen from his water-well drilling outfit along State Route 590 just west of the Jackson township school building. He said the theft occurred between 8 p.m. Tuesday and 8 a.m. Wednesday. One battery was taken from a truck and the other was an industrial battery.

Herbert Eagon, natural resources director of Ohio has approved a 50-year contract which will permit the International Salt

Co. to mine salt underneath Lake Erie. The company will sink a 2,000-foot-deep shaft to produce crushed rock salt. The company will pay the State of Ohio a royalty of five cents a ton, the standard price all over the country for any salt taken from the 5,193-acre tract which lies off the mouth of the Cuyahoga River near Cleveland in the so-called Whisky Island district.

Robert C. Carpenter, executor of the estate of Mary Lou Cramer filed an answer in Seneca County Common Pleas Court to the petition of Erma Baird of Fostoria in which she is asking \$15,838.02 from the estate for expenses and services. The defendant executor says in his answer that the services performed by the plaintiff for the deceased were not of the extent and value claimed and he asks that the true and correct amount be determined from the evidence.

Thieves broke in Bob's Gulf Service Station in Bradner Thursday night and carried away a new \$800 cash register containing \$100 in change. Entrance was gained by breaking a window in the back door and reaching through to turn the lock on the door. Nothing else was taken. The cash register weighed 300 pounds. It was not insured.

The famed Malabar Farm near Lucas, home of the late Louis Bromfield, was sold to the "Friends of the Land." The deed transferring the property was filed in the Richland County Court House at Mansfield to be recorded.

Wood County will be divided into three court districts in connection with the new county court system in Ohio which replaces the justice of the peace courts. The northern district is composed of Ross, Ferrysburg, Lake and Troy townships with a population of 21,109. The Central district is composed of Weston, Plain, Center, Freedom, Webster, Grand Rapids, Washington and Middleton townships with a population of 22,176. The southern district is composed of Milton, Portage, Liberty, Montgomery, Jackson, Henry, Bloom and Perry with a population of 19,409. Judge Earl K. Solesher has ordered that courts be established at the following places: Northern district at Moline, Central district at Bowling Green, and Southern district at North Baltimore. The three judges for these districts will be elected in the November election.
